Applied Colour I

Applied Colour 1 covers colour principles and theory. There are no perequisites to take this 45 hour (one 3 hour course per week) that is taken during the first term.

The course objectives are to understand the effects of colours on a room, the relation of colours between themselves and the theory of them (like the primary, secondary, complementary colours etc....), the language of colour (tint, value and shade), the differences between styles, harmony and the ambiance of a design. We also learn the warm colours and the cold colours. The course's goal is to to help us with our choice of colours and the effect of the colours on a room that we have to consider when it is time to design a room. The only material to buy for this course is a paper cutter to cut our samples.

There are many big projects during the term but I will only explain two of them. The two projects were similar in the task but were different at the end. In the first project, we had to design (only adding color) walls, roofs,

fabrics, floors and the furniture. We also had to add wallpaper while taking into consideration the theme and colour that the teacher gave us to respect in our design propositions. We needed to make our choice to fit with the style and the mood of a customer. In the second project, the tasks were the same but we had to do it for a condo: the bedroom, the living room and the kitchen (counters, cabinets, etc. ...). We finally had to make a sample board to present.

Personally, I found this course very interesting and helpful for designers. My only criticism is that since I studied visual arts in secondary, I knew a lot of the theory so I found it a little bit boring sometimes.

Colour is very important part that we absolutely have to consider when making a design.


As a future designer she wants to refine her art by undertaking visual arts classes after completing her Interior Design program. Deepening her understanding of arts and

Drawing & Design

In interior design, drawing is a very important way to communicate. It is a way to express ourselves and it is also a great work tool. There are four major types of drawings that we use: sketching, architectural and design planning, CAD drawing (computer assistance drawing) and rendering.

First of all, as designers, we use sketching (hand drawing) to create furniture or spaces. We make sketches to show quickly what the final project will look like. These drawings are not very long, just a couple of lines on a sheet is good to give us a main idea of the final product. This type of drawing is totally free. You need to let your imagination talk. It is habi-



tually the first step in the creation process. It is not very complicated to do it. You just need a pen or a pencil and a sketchbook or even just a little piece of paper and you're in business.




As designers, a part of our job is also to do architectural and design plans. When we design interiors, we need to consider the architecture, so architecture is also a little part of our job. We can change the interior architecture but can't change the exterior architecture. These plans explain everything that's necessary to know for the electricians, plumbers, contractors, engineers, architects, customers, etc. so they need to be very strict and clear. There are many rules to respect when we draw up plans. On these plans, we draw the furniture, the accessories, the architectural elements, etc. We have to make sure that the space is as esthetic and functional as possible.

Another of the most used types of drawings is CAD (computer assistance drawing). We do it with a specialised software named AutoCAD. It is the most used one to do architectural plans and computer drawing. It is a very expensive and complicated, but you can do everything related to architecture and design with it, for example, 2D, 3D, furniture, spaces, etc.

Finally, we also do renderings. This type of drawing is used to show a really elaborate and detailed rendering to the customers. We can do it by hand or with specialized software. On these renderings, we put architectural elements, furniture, colours, materials, etc. A rendering needs to be as realistic as possible. Sometimes, it can even look like a picture!

Finally, I would say that drawing is one of the most important parts of our job. Without drawing, our job couldn't exist.





Design Project 2

Design Project 2 is given in the second semester and students learn how to make a good plan. The course prerequisite is a good mark in Design Project 1. The hours that the student has to spend in class are four hours and two hours working at home.

The course objectives are to organize a plan, understand the demand of customers and understand the process of developing a concept and a result. The students also have to develop good planning and scheduling skills.

In this course the students need to use tracing paper, a measuring tape and many different sized tip drawing pens.

Design:

The art or action of conceiving of and producing a plan or drawing of something before it is made.

Oxford Dictionary

In this course, the students learn how to create a design for various spaces in a residential project and their characteristics. They learn how to organize simple spaces, for example living rooms, dining rooms, and halls, how to take measurements and analyze the requests of the clients. As well, they make plans using clearance, ergonomics and are concerned about the living habits and needs of the occupants. They also integrate new designs with old ones.

The projects in this course integrate all the concepts they have learned so far. For example, they had a course in AutoCAD and they use this software in Design Project 2. As well, they learn about how to manage a project with every step to achieve a good result and how the foundation of the building is made to be able to organize the project and the design. The students have to explain their ideas with annotation, which is describing things that you place in your plans. For the marks, the students have three projects in the term.

I think that this course is very interesting because you learn a lot of information that you are going to apply in all of the projects you will undertake. Design Project 2 is important because it helps you understand the reality of a designer's career and how to do make good projects that you will be proud to present to your clients.

If you want to be a good designer, make sure not to flunk this course!

This short video talks about the accomplishment and most famous buildings made by architect Zaha Hadid. Her first major building project is the 1993 Vita Fire Station in Weil Am Rhein, Germany.

She did a lot of buildings that are contemporary and futuristic like the annual Serpentine Gallery Pavilion commision (London), Phaeno Science Centre (Wolfsburg, Germany), BMW Central Building (Leipzig), the MAXXI museum (Rome), the Evelyn Grace Academy (London), Aquatics Centre for the 2012 Olympic Games (London), Dongdaemun Design Plaza (Seoul) and the Heydar Aliyev Centre (Baku, Azerbaijan).

She is a master of Parametricism, which uses algorithms to create architectural forms.

Creativity and Conceptual Research is a 45 hour course taken in your second term of interior design. The prerequisite to take this course Creative Techniques.

In this course you need to buy a pencil, scissors, a glue stick and a USB stick. You also need to make sure you have the ability to think in a different way than you are used to.



The main objective of this class is to help you develop your ability to put into practice the many steps of the creative process: to produce ideas, to learn how to organize the idea you kept and to realise them.

The first assignment in this class is to find analogies from an object in your house. Then you have to find animals, objects or plants which look similar to your object. From the retained pictures you keep one and transform it using formatting tools in PowerPoint. From these transformed pictures you create names for a consumable good, a piece of clothing and for



an object of your choice. You combine the picture and the name created and make it into wrapping paper for the object you chose. When you done you present it to the rest of the class to get their appreciation your creating process.

As of today there is not another assignment thought


of by the teacher, even though this class has been given for many years. The first project is the only one which stays the same as the teacher also wants to use her creativity to help us develop ours.





This way moving out is easy as you don't have as many objects to move and it is easy to maintain by yourself.

She does not believe that for something to be beautiful it has to have lots of details and to be made of luxurious materials. She actually finds simple chairs such as the Mies Van Der Rohe's Barcelona Chair much more captivating in an environment than an antique Victorian armchair bought for \$10,000 at an auction.

"Playing with shapes and volumes to create the perfect piece of furniture gives a better result than working too hard on details and making it lose its real purpose."

Her simplistic approach to design and architecture is sure to make her stand out in the field and maybe she is to become the next Zaha Hadid.



Do it Yourself: Plans

ou have to make a plan and don.t know how to. Here is some Information to achieve a good result.

The first important element you have to consider is the clearance. Clearance is a standard space that designers consider for the ergonomics. For example, in a living room, the designers consider that between a table and a sofa, we have to leave at least 18 inches, because with 18 inches, we are able to sit on the sofa and put something on the table.




Ergonomics is concerned with making a space comforta-

ble for everybody; it is based on anthropometry. For example, in the kitchen, the cupboard is at 36 inches from the floor. Experts made tests and they found out that 36 inches was comfortable for the majority of the people tested. If you don't know the clearance needed inside of a room, you can look on internet. There are many websites and pictures about it.

Every house has architectural elements in it and sometimes it is difficult to create a good design using these architectural elements. There are two categories of architectural elements: First is the element of structure and second is the

electric installation. Some examples of structural elements are exterior walls, interior walls and beams. For the electric installation, there are lights, burglar alarms and electric outlets. The elements of structure are easy to integrate in a design. For example, if you have a beam in your living room, you could use a wall to integrate a library. For an electric installation, in a bedroom, you can place the electric outlet behind the des-

ignated space for the bed, which would hide it and at the same time place the electric cord out of sight.



For a good design you have to understand the space inside of a room by imagining yourself moving in it and following the flow from the entryway to each different area of the plan. If you think about the function of the room and the activities that you are going to do there, you will place the furniture appropriately to create a good circulation and the space of the room will be filled evenly. For example, if you have a big room, you can use bigger furniture than in a smaller room. As well, you have to figure out what you are going to place in the room: furniture, accessories and equipment. For example, in a bedroom you have to choose a bed, bedside tables, and a chest of drawers, For the accessories you have lamps, mirrors, rugs and for the equipment you can put a television, but it is not recomended if you want a good night sleep.





So, if you take care of the clearance, integrate the architectural elements and understand the space, you will have a great very good design.



Arts & Style II: Antiquity to Renaissance



almost sure to become the leader at a great interior design firm. "OK everyone, let's do it!"






How To Draw Using Autodesk® Autocad®

you want to create floor plans, front views or furniture on a computer, you should use programs like AutoCAD. Here are some reason why:


First of all, it is easier to draw with AutoCAD than by hand because you are not forced to use a ruler or a square all the time. In this program, you can be sure that the lines are always straight. If you do your work properly, you should not have any errors in the measurement because it is your computer and the programs that make the calculations.

Secondly, you have a lot of commands that you can use to draw like line commands, polylines, splines, circles, rectangle, arcs and ellipses. You can also use hatching in your drawing. The hatching is used to show the texture of the floor or the texture of furniture. Creating the textures by hand would take a lot of time and it would not be clear to understand.



Thirdly, you can use several layers for interior walls, exterior walls, furniture, doors, etc. You can select different colors for each layer that you use. For example, blue is usually used to do the door arc, yellow is used to do the frame for impression and magenta is use to write the text on the drawing.

The fourth reason is that you can create blocks to use later in your drawings. A block is the drawing of a window, furniture, a door, etc. that you can save to



later insert in your plans, this way you do not need to always draw what you want. You just have to use the command insert and select the block you need in your file to use it in your plan. It is real child's play!

In summary, Autodesk AutoCAD is a great program if you are starting in design or architecture and this way you can do your drawings much easier.

"If you are looking for something trendy don't even try to find me"




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How to Make Your Tiny Student Apartment Cozy by Spending Little! By Marc-Antoine Gagnon

you started college and moved out of your parent's house you find yourself with a major challenge: How to make your tiny apartment cozy with a part time job salary and a 500 dollar credit card?



The first step you have to take is to draw a detailed plan of your apartment. It is recommended to use grid paper and take your measurements in inches, as most stores give their furniture dimensions in inches rather than centimetres. This plan will be used for you to try out different positions for the furniture you will find rather than moving the actual furniture around and disturbing your neighbors.

You will then need to determine what cozy means for you. As it is not a style but a feeling, you need to know what makes you comfortable. You can look at pictures related to cozy interiors, comfortable living or interior design on Google or Pinterest to help you.

As your apartment is small you have to keep in mind that you should not use too many textures and if you do make sure they are soft. Avoid bright contrasts, oversized prints, dark colours and oversized furniture.

If it is one of your interest you could create some makeshift pieces of furniture using cinderblocks as a bed frame or a <u>wood pallet to</u>

<u>create a coffee table</u>. Be creative as it is your own furniture that you are designing.

For the remaining furniture you can look at what is sold at your nearby flea market, at a garage sale or even some online ads on websites like Kijiji.ca and Craiaslist.ca. There are also some second hand stores like EcoDepot Montreal, The Salvation Army, "Village des Valeurs", or the "Société Saint-Vincent de Paul" selling furniture for sometimes as little as five dollars.

The only piece of furniture you should buy new is your mattress.

If you find yourself with mismatched furniture just know that it is possible to make it match together to create an interesting Boho / Vintage / Shabby Chic style. Or if these styles are not to your liking you can always sand it and paint or varnish it in another tone. For the upholstery it is more tricky. If it is used or just does not match sometimes a throw on the

sofa does the trick.







For the countertops, it explains that before choosing the countertop, you have to think about how you will use the countertops.


For the flooring, it explains explains that the kitchen floor has to be comfortable underfoot, water-tight and slip resistant, etc.
