



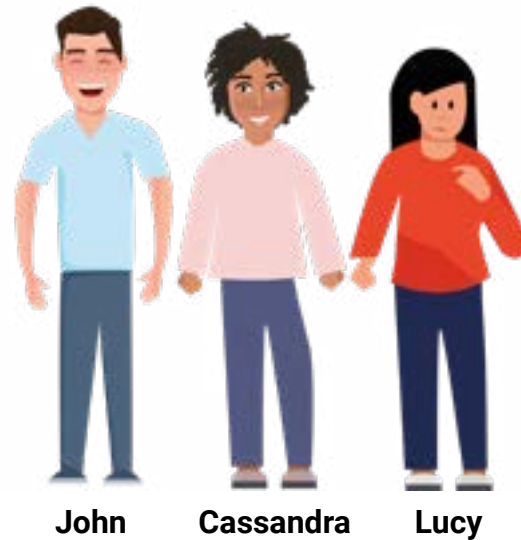
Comparatives, Superlatives and Equatives

STEP 1: Assessment

STEP 2: Theory



1. John is happier than Lucy.
2. Cassandra's top is as beautiful as Lucy's.
3. John is the tallest.

- Comparatives compare two people or things.
- Superlatives compare more than two people or things.
- Equatives compare people or things that are equal in some way.

COMPARATIVES: Read the comparative rules and fill in the blank with the comparative form of the adjective.

Comparative Rules		Comparative Sentence
one syllable adjectives	Add er followed by than .	Marco is (rich) <i>richer than</i> Miguel.
two-syllable adjectives ending in y	Change the y to i and add er followed by than .	English is (easy) <i>easier than</i> French.
two or more syllable adjectives	Add more or less before the adjective followed by than .	I think playing hockey is (exciting) <i>more exciting than</i> watching it.

SUPERLATIVE: Read the superlative rules and fill in the blanks with the correct form of the superlative.

Superlative Rules		Superlative Sentence
one syllable adjectives	Add the before the adjective and est to the ending.	Jeff Bezos was (rich) <i>the richest</i> person in the world in 2020.
two-syllable adjectives ending in y	Add the before the adjective and change the y to i and add est .	English is not (easy) <i>the easiest</i> language to learn.
two or more syllable adjectives	Add the most or the least before the adjective.	A lot of students believe that being an influencer is (exciting) <i>the most exciting</i> job in the world.

EQUATIVE: Fill in the blanks with the correct form of the equative (comparing people or things that are equal in some way).

Equative Rule		Equative Sentence
all adjectives	Add as before and after the adjective.	Skiing is (exciting) as exciting as snowboarding.

Note Some adjectives have irregular forms		
Adjective	Comparative	Superlative
good	better than	the best
bad	worse than	the worst

STEP 3: Controlled and Communicative Exercises

EXERCISE 1: Fill in the blanks with the correct form of the comparative, superlative or equative. Then, answer the questions.

1. This semester at school, Paul is (motivated) **more motivated than** last semester.

- Why did you add “more”?
- Are you more or less motivated at school this semester compared to last semester?

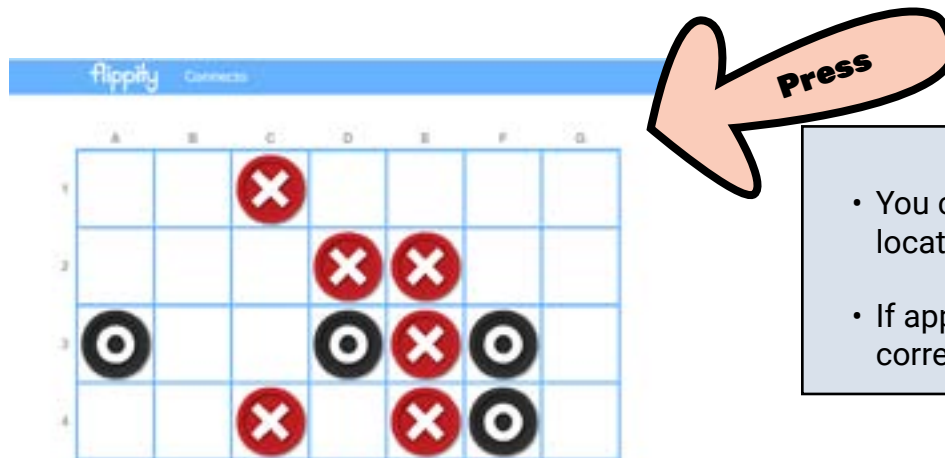
Tutor Note

- Don't ask the “why” questions if your tutee's answers are correct.

2. I am (*busy*) *busier than* I was last year at school.
 - Why did you drop the y and add *ier*?
 - Are you busier at school this year than you were last year?
3. My prom dress was (*expensive*) *the most expensive* piece of clothing I ever bought.
 - Why did you add “the most”?
 - What was the most expensive piece of clothing you ever bought?
4. Dave and Pierre both got 100% on the physics exam. Dave is (*smart*) *as smart as* Pierre.
 - Why did you use “as + adjective + as”?
 - Do you think cats are smarter than dogs?
5. My English teacher was (*bad*) *the worst* teacher I had at high school.
 - Who was your worst teacher at high school? Who was the best?

STEP 4: Production task

EXERCISE 1: Play Comparative, Superlative and Equative Connect 4.
